### **Pa.’s State System chancellor seeks cooperation among 14-member schools**

Every student attending a State System of Higher Education school should have access to both courses on that campus and to the full array of offerings delivered remotely by the 14-member universities, the system’s new chancellor said Wednesday.

#### **Six College Experiences Linked to Student Confidence on Jobs**

When college undergraduates are asked why they decided to get a bachelor's degree, the most commonly cited reason is to get a good job. A study of more than 32,000 U.S. undergrads conducted by Strada Education Network and Gallup indicates that about one-third (34%) strongly agree that they will graduate with the knowledge and skills they need to be successful in the job market, while an additional 37% somewhat agree (by selecting a "4" on the 5-point agreement scale).
