- LGBT+ History Month is recognized in October to coincide with National Coming Out Day on October 11th. This year marks the 31st anniversary of National Coming Out Day.
- It began in 1994 when Rodney Wilson, a history teacher, first proposed that an entire month be dedicated to the teachings of LGBT History.
- On October 14, 1979 the first National March on Washington for Lesbian and Gay Rights occurred.
- International Pronoun Day celebrated October 16th seeks to make respecting, sharing, and educating about personal pronouns commonplace.
- Spirit Day celebrated October 20th is where people around the nation where purple in support of LGBT youth.
- The murder of Matthew Shepard is also remembered this month. His death sparked the Matthew Shepard and James Byrd, Jr. Hate Crimes Prevention Act passed October 22, 2009.
- While the historic decision on Marriage Equality in 2015 gave same-sex couples the right to marry in all 50 states, there are still Anti-LGBT laws being proposed.
